

About Jenny



JENNY DAY's equestrian journey began at the age of nine, when, after much persistence, her parents gave in and bought her a pony. Living in Pennant Hills, just 22 km from the centre of Sydney, the family also kept 300 chickens, six sheep, and occasionally a cow. Jenny's first pony, Debbie, was a real character with a signature move of rearing, landing, and pigrooting, regularly unseating Pony Club instructors with her antics.

A family move to Zambia, in Central Africa, brought a new chapter and a new horse: a lovely, well-behaved off-the-track Thoroughbred named Copper Lass. The two enjoyed hacking out, cross-country, and show jumping together over their two-and-a-half years abroad.

Upon returning to Australia, Jenny set horses aside to focus on study, until a shift in lifestyle brought them back. Alongside her husband, she co-owned 500

acres in Merriwa, which rekindled her passion. She began breeding Welsh ponies and Arabians, and in 1989, the family relocated from Glebe to Orange, selling their Merriwa share and bringing the horses with them.

Her children enjoyed the ponies, though only her daughter Jane continued riding. Jenny eventually stopped riding herself, partly due to her new role as "strapper mum" and partly due to a troublesome hip that made riding difficult.

In 2004, Jenny became a dressage judge, though she waited nearly two decades before upgrading from F to E level in 2023, something she now admits she could have done much sooner. She takes great joy in judging and finds it especially rewarding to watch horse and rider combinations develop and progress through the levels.


